MISSION

"BACK IN YOUR OUR OWN BACKYARD"

The older I get, my imagination is captured when I hear "Lady Day" Billie Holiday sing the song "Back in Your Own Backyard." I was reminded of this fascination on the morning of the big snow fall three weeks ago which I call the "Blizzard of '24." I was journaling on the back deck when I wrote "from where I sit, I hear the scraping of the front-walk being shoveled. For a moment, the sound makes me anxious but back here all I see are marshmallow pillows covering every flat surface. It's a cotton ball wonderland hiding all the garden's weeds, the car's rusty panels, and the house's



peeling paint normally seen." That's the moment when I thought of Lady Day's song. She must have been singing about what God sees looking at the creation – on that Tuesday morn we were all given a vision of God's creation in the Garden of Eden "right in our own backyards" during the storm, but it's so easy to overlook this vision.



On Thursday at the tail-end of the storm, I attended the Downtown Neighborhood Association meeting in Lacy Mansion where this newly reorganized group struggled to define "who are we?" We asked ourselves the questions: what binds us together in this neighborhood and what makes us a unique part of the Dubuque community? Looking out the mansion's window that overlooked Jackson Park, once again I thought of Lady Day's song. Hear the lyrics: "The bird with feathers of blue, is waiting for you, back in your own backyard. You'll see your castle in Spain, through your window pane, back in your own backyard. Oh you can go to the

east, go to the west, but someday you'll come weary at heart where you started from, you'll find your happiness lies, right under your eyes, back in your own backyard."

In the city's formative years, the grounds in the backyard of the Lacy Mansion served as the city cemetery. 11 years after the city was chartered in 1837, our church's founder Rev. Peter Flury buried his wife Sophia there. When the church edifice was built in 1896, this sacred land became the "backyard" of the church he founded. The land is also sacred to the Mesquakie Tribe who were the inhabitants of the land long before white settlers had arrived. Many Mesquakie revere this land as their own burial grounds. Last summer during our ceremony to consecrate the grounds of Sophia Jackson Flury's burial, I saw Mesquakie native Jodie Durin praying in the middle of the park, showing his reverence for his own people buried here. Chief Blackhawk, whose people are close relatives of the Mesquakie Tribe, refused to leave his Sauk Village home on the Mississippi River downstream from Dubuque because "the bones of my father are buried here." Their reverence for the land led to the massacre of his followers by the US government and the opening of the land for white settlement in

1832. During the Blizzard of '24, we were given a glimpse of how God sees the creation – not buried under the front working city street but

front yard grim of a busy working city street, but blanketed with the pristine beauty of backyard snow. Living through many lowa winters can leave us with jaded outlooks about the "beauty of backyard snow," but to paraphrase Lady Day Billie Holiday, we need to "take the time to smell the roses." Jackson Park is one of those "Garden of Eden roses" in our church's downtown neighborhood located "in the backyard of our church."
